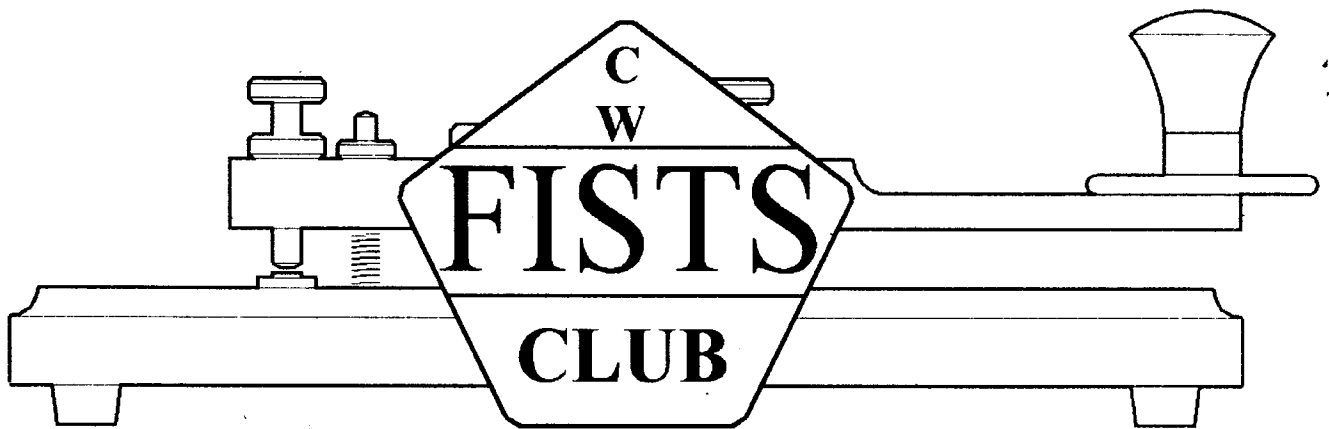

Major Changes under way

Well since we have many larger items that just can not fit in the 4 pages we have now and in each edition we waste nearly one page with the standard header, subs details and QSL information, not to mention new members details (which are getting more and more of) we have decided to produce Keynote in an A5 booklet (in the same way that G-QRP and many other clubs do) this will give us some breathing room, we can then include Bobs Contest newsletter "brasspounder", more technical stuff , antenna advice, sections tuned more to what people want to see, to start with we will have a total of 24 pages to play with and I'm sure you will find it a much more interesting read than the current version. The draw back from this change is that we will only produce it quarterly so rather than getting keynotes every 4 or 5 weeks it will be every 3 months but it will be of a much higher quality content, it will still retain its friendly banter and old favourites like Geo's "Strawberry Basket" will be reappearing (for those that can remember it) plus new sections like Sales and Wants, The content will be CW oriented , it will not be allowed to become just another general magazine , we can give you a "No Microphone" guarantee! Hi, the new format will be available in both paper and email form and it is hoped that the first edition will be out for spring 2007, and then followed by the summer, Autumn, and Winter editions, this change will NOT increase the subscription cost to members.

 Upto now members subs have been due at the anniversary date of joining, this has given us many problems in the past and made it harder for members to know when their next payment was due, we are going to simplify things, ALL membership fees will be due on the first of April each year, don't panic, we have a way of making sure it doesn't cost you more money if you have paid up to a date past April.

This will only effect members when they come to renew their membership, see the table below for payment details

The figures are percentage of your normal subs so for example someone that needs to renew in Sept 07 would pay 50% of their normal payment at that time and then their renewal date will be 1st April from then on.

Renewal date between Now and April 07 :-	100%
Renewal between May and July 07 :-	75%
Renewal between August and October 07:-	50%
Renewal between November and Dec 07 :-	25%

After this payment your subs will always be due 1st April and we will be sending a reminder with the winter edition of keynotes together with a standing order form to allow automatic easy payments straight from your bank or building society in future. (no more forgotten renewals) We will included a letter explaining this better with the next keynote so don't worry.

This will make our lives much easier and we will be able to budget better for the following year.

I am sure that some will not like these changes but we hope that the majority of our members can see the sense in these changes and that they will help bring FISTS into a new league.

The Eagle Radio Group (MX0ERG) 09838 is a radio group on the Lincolnshire coast. We meet once a month at the Eagle Hotel in Mablethorpe, and we have about 40-plus members who live in the surrounding area. We have a fair number of CW operators, ex-navy and of course ex-Humber Radio among them.

We hold quite a few public events throughout the year, but our main showcase is the Mablethorpe Show which takes place in July on the Tennyson School playing field. Most of the public services are represented (Police, Fire, Ambulance, Coastguard, Lifeboat etc.), along with all the local charities and voluntary organisations.

In the past we have tried various ideas to interest the public, particularly the young. Two years ago we had a visit from the RSGB's Funbus (GB4FUN), and last year we went 'hi-tech' with computers and data modes. We decided this year to go hands-on, 'low-tech'. Small certificates were awarded to people who successfully sent their names in Morse. The response by all age groups well exceeded our expectations.



There was a lot of interest from young people of both sexes, and it was interesting to see how rapidly they achieved the correct rhythm and spacing. We had a few surprises - a nun who was very much at home on the key (Girl Guide training), and a few WW2 radio operators who had not lost it. Altogether we gave out over 120 certificates; I had to make a quick trip home to print more! There was often a queue, and people were able to practise using our collection of Morse keys while they waited.

We were very pleased with the exhibition, and have gained at least one new group member as a result of the event. Some members of the group would like to repeat the idea next year. Why not? It's the best response we have ever had. LONG LIVE MORSE

A report of the weeks activity by Peter, G3JFS

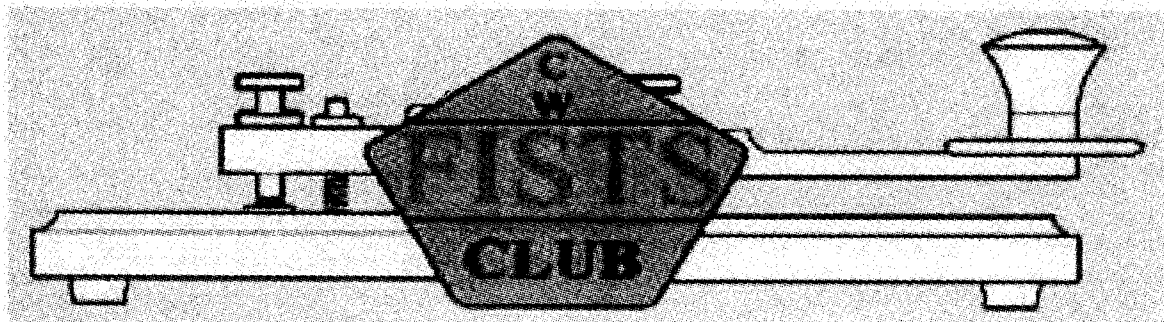
Conditions were lousy with very little short skip propagation in the daytime and deep qsb on the few signals that did appear. Activity by Fists members was disappointing but I worked several who either didn't know about the SKW or were using a paddle and didn't know they still gave points to straight key users. That might account for the low level of activity as several people said they do not own a straight key. I lost count of the number of cq calls that I put out on the Fists frequencies without a reply. In all I had 31 'Fists' contacts with 25 different members out of a total of 120 contacts. Evening time on 80m was the best for working members. 15 and 10m were dead when I listened and I had only one qso on 15m. Best dx was Ron, ZL1AMO, a non-member, on 40m and a few USA stations on 20m.

My key is a 'Raymart Speed Key' bought in 1947 when I first started to learn Morse code. I'm not sure exactly how much it cost but it was about 10/- (= 50p) and as a 12-yr old schoolboy I had to save a few weeks pocket money to pay for it. Like its owner it is now showing its age but still works and was a good investment. Since retiring 11 yrs ago it has been used to make over 37,000 contacts. It has also been around the world a couple of times and seen 'service' in the UK, W. Australia, Nigeria, Kenya and Germany.

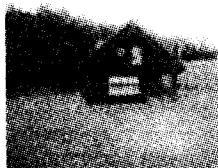
Someday, my family and I want to go to Memuro, and to meet Leo-san's family again. I want to enjoy the radio to my heart's content in wide field like Hokkaido.

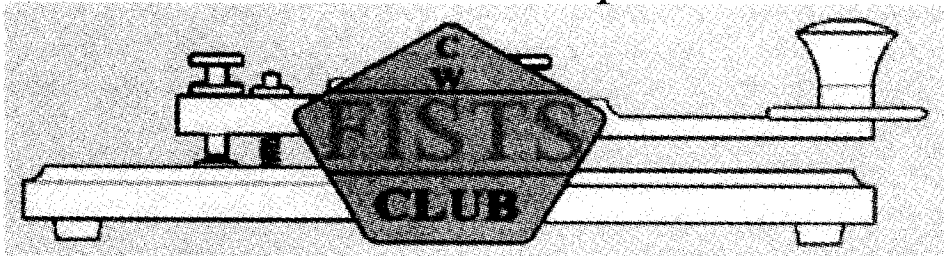

It was the first time for me to hear a signal from the US in such early afternoon. I had a fixed idea that we can hear signals from the US on 40m only between the early evening and midnight. When I wrote about it on my weblog, Shin, JA1NUT gave me a comment that he used to hear Ws on 40m in the early afternoons and even in the mornings when the band condx was good in the past decades. His comment dispelled my stereotypes. And I was excited to think that we are surely having a DX season now. I can say...the mysterious propagation of HF really captivates us.

Lawsuit brought against government over PLC by 100 or more HAMs

The Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications of Japan (MIC) revised a part of their ministerial ordinance on October 4th to amend a code of radio facilities without providing any straight answers to the questions which had been repeatedly asked by specialists. This revision of the rules leads a possibility to use PLC modems under their type approval. Under this revision of the ministerial ordinance, the utilization of PLC modems is confined to be only indoors but it does not make any differences and it is obvious that we, amateur radio stations, will have significant interference from those PLC modems. The high frequency wave provided to unbalanced power lines is easily radiated from the lines because the length of indoor wirings are quite similar to that of HF antennas and this is clear from the sequence of concrete examples overseas.

Toshikazu Kusano, JA1ELY, the editor of "Five-nine DX magazine" and Teiichi Aoyama, JA1IDY, a professor of Musashi Institute of Technology pursue legal action against the minister of MIC to stop their model specification of the PLC modems which transmit and receive signals on the carrier wave in the range from 2MHz to 30MHz.

JA1ELY recruited other HAMs to form the plaintiffs group for trial on the internet and over 100 HAMs applied to be the one of the plaintiffs. Each of them donates the cost of litigation and they are now mapping out a long-range strategy with their competent lawyers. Some of the FEA members also applied to be the claimant to get involved in this case and waiting for the mandate form from the professional representatives for the plaintiff.



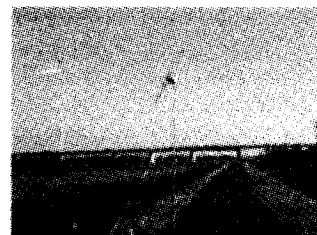

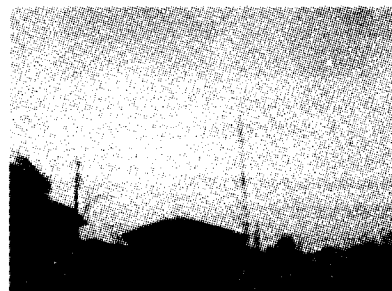
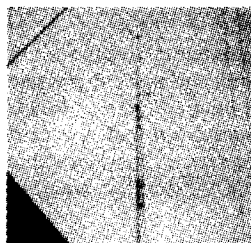

Hello dear friends !

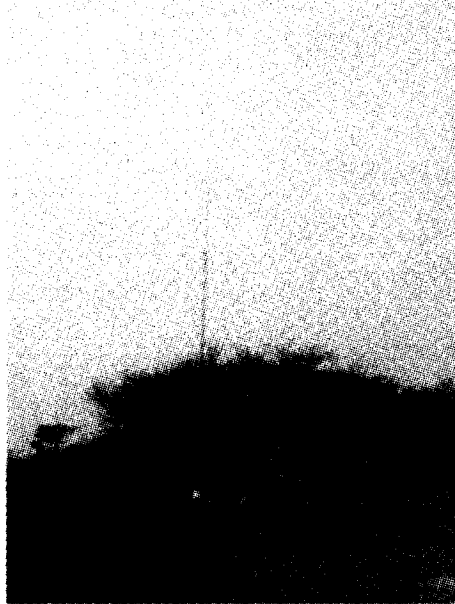

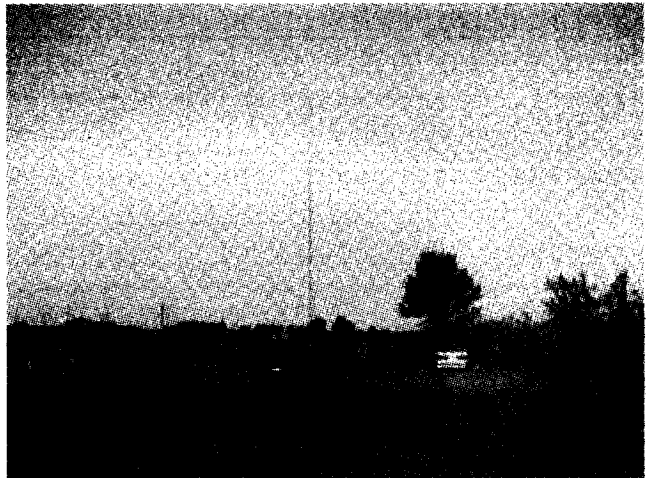

ZL6FF IN THE FISTS COAST-TO-COAST CONTEST 2006

ZL2BSJ-Wilbert #9637 operated ZL6FF from Quartz Hill during the annual C2C contest. - Here's his report on the event that originally appeared on the Quartz Hill Supporters' website:

ZL6FF is the New Zealand flagship of the Fists Club, a worldwide bunch of radio amateurs who are committed to keeping Morse telegraphy, or CW, up there.

On the agenda was the Coast-to-Coast activity where you can work in CW anything that moves. This event is supposed to be friendly and low-key (so to speak). The C2C runs over 24 hours, and to complete a QSO, there is quite a bit to send: report, name, state or country and Fists number or power level.

Unfortunately, chief operator Ralph ZL2AOH and visiting op Nigel ZL2TX were both out of action, so it fell to Wilbert ZL2BSJ to put ZL6FF on the air from Quartz Hill.

At 06:00 on Sunday, it was an early start. The bands were a bit flat... nothing much was happening even after 40 minutes of calling CQ...until it was realised that - out in the paddock - the Rhombic had been disconnected from its open wire feeders. Marvellous what those antenna tuners will load into!

Having changed to a working antenna on the patch-panel, ZL6FF went looking for the US on 20 m. The band still sounded suspiciously quiet and the few USA Fists were weak, but on narrow-bandwidth modes such as CW, almost anything is workable. The 20 m USA long path was firmly closed, however, and by midday there were only 20 stations in the log. Fists Station operator John at VK2FDU/4 confirmed that things weren't much better across the ditch.

Club stations like ZL6FF are supposed to call 'CQ C2C' and often the people who called - while keen to work DX - did not know the exchange. Having to explain it to them dragged things out a bit, but the ZL6FF philosophy was that it all added up to quality band-noise.

By Sunday mid-afternoon 20 m was dry with only 50 QSOs logged, and 15 and 10 m remained closed. The operator was becoming concerned about being accused of 'slacking on the job'...so the operation moved to 40 m.

This band went very well into Europe on the long path, but not many Fists were worked as the run-frequency went crazy. Clearly, European pile-ups don't do 'low-key'...they are more into down key! Anyway, lots of EU ops reported '80 W' or '100 W' and verticals, Windoms, G5RVs and dipoles. All were excellent copy - as long as the pack stood by. Best DX: DK1VD running 5 W into a vertical, armchair copy at 559.

Quartz Hill contester Chris Tran ZL1CT (FISTS # 9648) called in from Invergordon signing GM3WOJ while the 40 m band petered out to Europe...and roared into life to the USA! The American opening (at East Coast sunrise) was even better, with competitive stations up to 20 dB over S-9 and people with 100 W and dipoles still S-9 copy.

At 12:46 UTC W3RSR in Pennsylvania - reporting "5 W" - was logged and ZL6FF went QRT with 217 QSOs in the log.

160 METRE EXPERIMENT TO EXPLORE MARCONI'S 1901 TRANSATLANTIC TESTS

A 160-meter beacon will take to the air this fall and winter from Cornwall, England, to explore how Guglielmo Marconi was able to span the Atlantic by wireless for the first time on December 12, 1901. Radio history says that's when the radio pioneer at a receiving station in Newfoundland successfully copied the Morse code letter "s" sent repeatedly by his team in the Cornwall town of Poldhu. The latter-day venture is a cooperative effort of the Poldhu Amateur Radio Club (PARK) in Cornwall and the Marconi Radio Club of Newfoundland (MCRN). The Poldhu club's Keith Matthew, G0WYS, said the 2001 centenary of Marconi's achievement reopened discussion into the mechanism by which the 1901 spark transmitter signal propagated.

"The winter of 1901 coincided with a sunspot minimum, and it was realized that this coming December 2006 should show similar conditions to those of December 1901," he said. Just how Marconi was able to receive the transatlantic transmission has long been a topic of discussion and even controversy, especially given the frequency Marconi is likely to have used, thought to be between 800 and 900 kHz, and the time of day, afternoon in Newfoundland.

"The beacon will help understand the possibility of low sunspot number transatlantic medium wave propagation 24 hours a day, but especially 1400 through 1800 UTC," Matthew said. The 160-meter amateur band is being used, he explained, because Marconi's original frequency today is a highly populated piece of the radio spectrum.

"It was realized that a clear channel would be necessary on the nearest amateur band, and a temporary license to operate a beacon on 160 meters has now been obtained," Matthew announced. Starting on or about November 1 and continuing through next February, the GB3SSS beacon will transmit on 1960 kHz.

The 1960 kHz beacon will use a two-minute transmit sequence starting at the top of the hour. It will consist of a CW identification followed by a series of carrier bursts, each reducing in power by 6 dB. Identification in PSK31 will follow. The transmit sequence will repeat at 15-minute intervals.

On the listening end in Newfoundland will be well-known low-frequency experimenter Joe Craig, VO1NA, of the MRCN, who lives near St John's. "This is a very exciting project," Craig said. "I am very grateful for the support from my fellow members in the club and our sister club, the Poldhu Amateur Radio Club." Craig offered his own observations on Marconi's 1901 feat in a 2001 article "Marconi's First Transatlantic Wireless Experiment," for The Canadian Amateur, the journal of Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) <<http://www.ucs.mun.ca/~jcraig/marconi.html>>. Also monitoring in North America will be the Antique Wireless Association's W2AN club station in upstate New York.

ARRL member and radio history buff Bart Lee, KV6LEE, proposed the 160-meter experiment to test the feasibility of Marconi's 1901-claimed achievement. "Continuing cooperation between Canadian and British Amateur Radio operators can thus play a part in verification of one of the most interesting events in the history of our technology," Lee said in his article "A Plea for Timely Experiments" on the California Historical Radio Web site <<http://www.californiahistoricalradio.com/photos53.html>>. Lee and Matthew recently visited with Craig and other MRCN members in Newfoundland.

MORSE CODE SOS MAKES A COMEBACK

B.B.C. News Item of Interest - forwarded by John Kirk, VK4TJ # 9080

London, England 20 October 2006.

Morse Code, the dots and dashes signalling system first used at sea on the Titanic and long since consigned to the scrapheap, made a triumphant comeback this week in the rescue of a stranded fisherman.

The man had run aground near Hayling Island on the south coast when his boat began taking on water. He had no modern safety aids and no phone – but it was dark and he did have a torch.

Using the code's legendary short and long flashes, he managed to communicate the SOS distress message to the coast guard building, where rescue officer Steve Mann was on duty.

"I was absolutely amazed to see the flashed SOS message." Mann (31) said. " I never thought I would ever see it. My colleagues, who have been here for about 12 years, have never heard of such a case before. It is very unconventional."

A spokesman for the Maritime and Coastguard Agency said Morse "never happens any more"!

"Nowadays most seamen have V.H.F. radio, flares or at least cell phones if they are inshore, to send an emergency message, but the fisherman, who had transferred all his safety equipment from his fishing vessel to a new boat, had none of these for his trip from Emsworth to nearby Thornham marina on Thursday evening - Just the Torch"!

Morse Code is no longer part of Coastguard Training. Mann, who had been with the coastguard for the past two years added "I have just picked up bits of Morse along the way!" He added; "This man was caught out on the one occasion he went to sea with absolutely no safety equipment. Even without radio communication, going to sea without even a portable flare is extremely dangerous and could cost you your life"

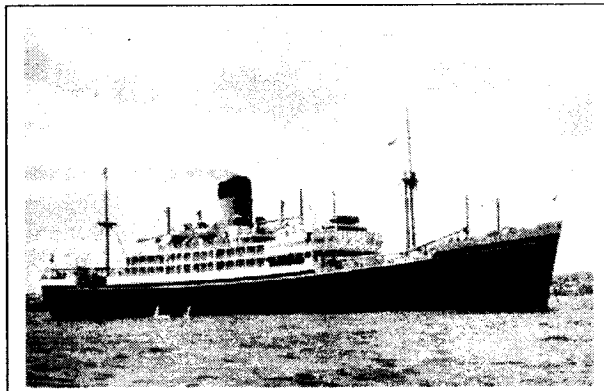
The Stricken Fisherman - was picked up later, by a Coastguard inshore lifeboat – Reuters.

(I seem to recall a very similar recent incident, where a Qantas Aircraft was asked to descend and look for a stricken yacht. The aircraft unable to contact the yacht by Radiotelephone used its lights to send Morse. The person aboard apparently knew Morse and replied! – Can anyone elaborate on this incident? I will have to bring the above article to the attention of my elder Son, David. He currently serves in the local New Zealand Coastguard and attends many incidents. At least he has a basic knowledge of Morse even though he is not interested in Amateur Radio – Ed)
