40m CW—My New Easy Listening Station

Because one of my hobbies is refurbishing vintage receivers, there are opportunities to tune in the world tucked into every free space in my home. For example, there's a Drake 2B on a shelf next to my kitchen table. Well, a few evenings ago, I found myself relaxing after dinner, listening to 40m CW. It's not Mozart, but there's something about listening to calls for CQ while suppressing the reflex urge to answer. And there's something calming about listening to two hams interchange location and weather information in stereotypical CW lock-step.

Of course, I reserve the right to listen to CW activity on the band as long as my significant other isn't home. She doesn't share the decades of interaction with others through CW. And that's OK. When I refurbish an old tube-type receiver, I always add a Bluetooth link to the output so that I can pop in a pair of wireless earbuds and listen unobtrusively.

Why the reflex relaxation response? I suppose it's like being among old friends. On the ham bands, everyone is respected for their technical abilities, communications style, and, for the CW aficionados among us, fluency with a straight key or paddle. There's also the subconscious association of CW with younger days, just as songs can trigger certain emotions. There are the days at the ham fests, searching for that

diamond in the rough that you can take home and make new again. The days at Field Day, climbing trees and slinging ropes to get an antenna off the ground. And, for some of us, taking that field trip to the local FCC office to take the CW and written components of the advanced and extra license exams.

So, why not give it a try tonight? Close your eyes, and listen to CW after a long day working from the home office. You just might find yourself drifting off to an earlier time, free of COVID and at least favorable sunspot activity.

Americas Chapter, President's Message

I'm on the radio every day now. I may not be on for any great length of time, just long enough to have a QSO or two and then maybe hunt a few Parks on the Air activators. Making contact with Parks on the Air stations gives me an idea of how my station is getting out and it is fun to make contact with those stations as they usually are running low power with compromised antennas.

I also follow the Facebook pages of various ham radio related groups, normally taking a peek at the Endfed Antenna group and the various CW groups. I notice that many amateur radio operators nowadays tend to start out on phone, but then move toward CW. They realize that CW operation allows them to make more contacts with less power and they just seem to like working code.

I have to admit that I did not think that so many hams would move to CW if they did not have to learn the code to obtain their licenses. I was wrong and, if you think about it, believing on one hand that using Morse Code is fun and exciting and then thinking that people won't use Morse Code unless they are "forced" to, just does not make sense. How can we think that CW is a great way to enjoy amateur radio and then believe that there has to be a requirement to learn Morse Code before most people will take the time and effort to learn the art? We have to have faith in the fact that we are not strange or weird because we like to use our keys to communicate. It's fun and

interesting and, of course, others will voluntarily join the party.

In fact, there are many who are just deciding that using Morse Code is the way to go as they activate parks for Parks on the Air or activate summits for Summits on the Air. There is just a lot of Morse Code activity with respect to those groups. There is a lot more room to grow, however, as the SSB guys usually outnumber the Morse Code operators three or four to one. But, I think there will be a lot of SSB ops who come around.

It also seems that the bands are as busy as they ever have been. You can turn on your radio any night of the week and hear signals all across the band. If someone calls "CQ" they normally will receive an answer. There is a lot of ragchewing going on along with the contests and other activities. Portable operations are a real popular thing to do and there is a shortage of portable rigs in stock at the dealers. The price of full function 100-watt radios has fallen compared to what radios cost twenty or thirty years ago in uninflated dollars.

We are at the beginning of the new sunspot cycle. While some are predicting a mediocre cycle, others are predicting one of the highest sunspot numbers in the last couple of hundred years based on a new 22 year cycle and how fast the magnetic field changes on the sun. While I don't know about this new 22 year cycle (we can only hope), I do know that 20 meters seems to be open a lot more than it was a couple of years ago. We are going to have a lot of fun over the next five or six years.

Bugs: Still Alive and Well After All These Years

Although many predicted CW's demise when the FCC first took that mode off the licensing requirements, it seems that mode is actually more popular than ever. Just listen on any contest weekend down in the CW-only portions of the bands. More than that, if you are like me and love CW ragchewing, more beginners are operating CW now. And many are using bugs, especially in activities where manual keys, not electronic keyers, are the only technology permitted.

Bugs, or semi-automatic Morse keys, have been around for more than a century now, ever since Horace Martin invented the first one and founded the Vibroplex Company in New York in 1905.

I first became fascinated with bugs in the mid 1960s when, as a teenager, I watched my Elmer, Bill, W6DDB (SK), use one at W6LS, the Lockheed Aircraft Amateur Radio Club in Burbank, CA. Bill had been a maritime CW op in the Merchant Marine during World War 2, and after as a commercial op. He was still a solid fist even into his 80s when I last worked him about 15 years ago.

It was around that time I turned that fascination into my own bug fist. I'd been inactive as far as CW for some 20 years, until sometime shortly after Y2K I became "bitten by the bug" again.

Part of that had to do with necessity. My brain was getting soft and needing some form of exercise, so I began listening to CW practice on the internet and on an old Heath HW-16 I had stored away. My copying was soon back up to 25 wpm.

Unfortunately, CW didn't have it as easy with my arthritic wrist as it did with my brain. My sending on a straight key was painful to send as well as listen to. Not having a lot of money to spend, I searched for a good deal on a used bug on eBay and soon found a 1940 Vibroplex Champion. A few months later, I scored a 1944 Lightning Bug. I still use both on the air.

As with anything, practice makes perfect. Dits are sent with the vibrating mechanical arm, while, unlike a keyer/paddle, Dahs must be sent by repeatedly pressing the paddle for each Dah. But like a keyer and paddle, this sideways motion is a lot more forgiving on the wrist than a straight key; I like to rest the side of my hand on the table and rock my forearm back and forth, while gently holding the paddle between my thumb and forefinger. I practiced with the sidetone on my IC-706, transmitter off, for a good month before I felt confident enough to get on the air.

QRS on a bug can be a bit of a challenge. I like to encourage hams who need to hear a slower fist, so back I went to eBay, this time for another weight for the Dit arm. Adding a second weight really helped me QRS, while at the same time not hampering me when I needed to QRQ. I can easily send 12–30 wpm even with the added weight.

Today there are still quite a few CW ops on the air who enjoy operating bugs. It's fun recognizing the swing of a good bug fist and sharing experiences. A ham in Argentina always signs "73 bugs 4 ever". Another op was Bob, W6BNB (SK), who even into his 90s was a solid fist on a bug, as well as a Cootie key. I had the pleasure of working him a number of times, and even having him demonstrate the Cootie key for me.



NEW SPRINT INFORMATION

Sprints will be held eight times throughout the year on the first Saturday and third Sunday in each of the following months: Feb., May, and Aug., with the exception of Nov., which will be the second Saturday and third Sunday.

OBJECTIVE:

To exchange specified information with as many FISTS members as possible using Morse Code only, and within the time frame stipulated. Sprints are a great opportunity for our newer members to get on the air, meet other club members, and have some fun! We encourage more experienced operators to please QRS to match the other operator's speed.

PARTICIPANTS:

Any properly licensed amateur radio operator, FISTS member or non-member is invited to take part in the contest. At least one of the two stations in each QSO must be a FISTS member.

DATES AND TIMES:

FALL SATURDAY SPRINT: from 1600 UTC to 1800 UTC on SECOND Saturday in November.

FALL SUNDAY SPRINT: from 2100 UTC to 2300 UTC on third Sunday in November.

BANDS:

Operation is limited to the following amateur bands: 3.5, 7, 14, 21, and 28 MHz amateur bands. Look for other participants around the FISTS frequencies: 3558, 7058, 14058, 21058, and 28058 kHz. You may NOT work the same station more than once.

ENTRY CLASSES:

There are three entry classes: QRO, QRP, and Club.

- 1. **QRO**: Over 5 watts to legal limit.
- 2. QRP: 5 watts output power or less.
- 3. Club: (regardless of power).

Entry class MUST be shown on logs to be considered for entry in a particular class, or will be assumed QRO. An entry must be ONE class only, no combination of classes allowed.

EXCHANGE:

The following information must be exchanged by both stations and shown in your log for each QSO to count as a valid QSO:

FISTS members: RST, S/P/C, first name, FISTS number. Non-FISTS members: RST, S/P/C, first name. (Enter "0" Zero if your logging program requires a power entry for non-members.) S/P/C = U.S. State/Canadian Province/DXCC Country

DX COUNTRY STATUS:

U.S. states and Canadian provinces are those states and provinces that are contiguous and found within the North American continent. DX are those entities listed in the current ARRL DXCC publication, other than the above.

MULTIPLIERS:

Each U.S. state (50) and Canadian province (13) counts as 1 multiplier. Count each only once, no matter how many times worked. Each DXCC country counts as 1 multiplier. Count each only once, no matter how many times worked. Canada and the USA do not count as DX multipliers.

SCORING:

Each QSO with a FISTS member: 5 QSO points. Each QSO with a non-FISTS member: 2 QSO points. Final score is total QSO points times the number of multipliers worked.

CERTIFICATES:

Certificates will be awarded to the first, second, and third place finishers in each Sprint for each Entry Class. End-of-Year Certificates will be awarded ONLY to FISTS members with the highest cumulative point totals in the QRO, QRP and Club categories for all Sprints at the end of the year. Certificate will be sent to the winners via email in PDF format.

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New Sprint Information (continued)

LOG SUBMISSIONS:

All log entries must be received within 14 days after the Sprint to be considered valid. Logs not sent to the proper address will not be considered for entry. The logs will be spot-checked for accuracy and correct scoring procedures. All logs MUST contain the following information for entry:

- 1. Your name, call sign, mailing address, and FISTS Number if member.
- 2. Club name and call sign if entry is for a club station.
- 3. Sprint worked—Date of the Sprint worked.
- 4. Entry class—QRO, QRP, or Club.
- 5. Number of FISTS members worked.
- 6. Number of non-FISTS worked.
- 7. FISTS number for FISTS QSOs.
- 8. List of multipliers.
- 9. Your claimed score.

ELECTRONIC LOGS:
