

HOW DO I GET AN APPLICATION? You can download a North American membership application or an application for DX on the FISTS web page http://www.fists.org. Information and an application can be mailed to you. Send a message Joe Pardue, W5OS (w5os@arrl.net) with your name, call sign, and postal address, or mail the request to Joe at 29 Melrose Dr., Marrero, LA 70072-5055

HOW DO I JOIN? Membership is open to all interested in Morse code, irrespective of their speed and ability. Subscriptions are \$15.00/year; Under 17= FREE; College students = \$10. Family members may join FISTS at no extra charge-only one newsletter is mailed per household. Send to FISTS, P. O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440 or via PAYPAL http://www.paypal.com (N.America only). Address your PAYPAL payment to FISTS@TIR.COM

NOTE: Checks can take 6-8 weeks to clear from the day received. Nancy processes them, updating the database, then takes them to the bookkeeper. The bookkeeper enters them into the "official books", then takes them to the bank. Depending on schedules that month, it can take 6-8 weeks. NOTE: Applications are processed as they come in, not held until checks clear - it doesn't take 8 weeks to get your number, it just may take that long for your check to clear.

WHERE DO I MAIL MY APPLICATION? North American applications are to be mailed to Nancy, WZ8C at P. O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440-0047. "FISTS Down Under" applications are to be mailed to Ralph Sutton, ZL2AOH at 12C Herbert Gardens, 186 The Terrace, Wellington 6001, New Zealand All other applications are to be mailed to Geo, G3ZQS at 119 Cemetery Rd, Darwen Lancs, BB3 2LZ.

HOW DO I GET A NUMBER FOR MY LOCAL CLUB? Clubs with FCC call signs may be assigned a FISTS number at no charge providing there is at least one FISTS member in good standing in the local club. These clubs are not legally affiliated with FISTS, nor does FISTS have anything to do with how the club is run, etc. It just means the club has a FISTS number and is worth three points toward awards. If the club wants a newsletter, there is a \$15 a year charge.

HOW DO I KNOW WHEN TO RENEW? Your renewal date is on your mailing label - please look at it! ONE renewal postcard is mailed out when your renewal time is near. If you've sent in your renewal but get a reminder postcard within a few weeks, please don't be concerned, the card probably crossed with your renewal.

HOW DO I RENEW? Send \$15/year or \$10/year for college students (under 17 and family members are free) to FISTS, P. O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440. or to Paypal using the email address fists@tir.com. Put RENEWAL in the comments section.

HOW DO I UPDATE MY ADDRESS or CALL SIGN ON THE FISTS DATABASE? Send corrections or changes to Nancy Kott, WZ8C, at FISTS, P. O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440. Please send labels with your corrections to the FISTS QSL Bureau so the bureau workers don't have to change all your SASEs by hand. HOW DO I GET AN UP-TO-DATE MEMBER LIST? Send a SASE with \$2.00 (US) to Ed N7CFA 2628 Lilac Street, Longview, WA 98632. Lists are available on the FISTS Web page.

HOW DO I GET ON THE FISTS EMAIL LIST? For periodic Email updates send your Email address, call sign and FISTS number to Kathi Hilton. fistelist@comcast.net. If you put your email address on your application, it is automatically added to the list. Due to potential spam problems, the list is NOT given out to the membership and is NOT published on the web page. It is ONLY used to notify you of FISTS items of interest. If you want people to know your e-mail address, we recommend you include it in your listing on QRZ.com or Buckmaster lookup service.

Hi FISTS!

The year has just started, but there is a lot going on. We ended 2003 with a bang by making a wonderful showing of Morse code support to the FCC and the ARRL. Thank you for taking the time out of your busy lives to drop a letter to the FCC and the ARRL, some FISTS even wrote to their elected government officials and local newspapers. By the way, newspapers are always looking for "human interest" stories. Consider contacting your local paper and inviting them out to see your shack. The most frequent comment I get from non-hams is, "Oh people still use Morse code?" The more we can make the general population aware that Morse code is still vital, the better awareness there will be of its use, not only as a hobby as a communications resource.

The ARRL has submitted a proposal to the FCC. This proposal essentially includes:

- *A three-tiered licensing structure, two of which permit HF access without a Morse code test *Retaining 5 WPM Morse code test for Extra
- *Making Technician licensees General class, whether or not they passed a Morse code exam. *Making Advanced class licensees Extra class. You can read the text of their proposal from a link on the FISTS web page http://www.fists.org.

As of this printing, the FCC has not acted on the ARRL proposal (nor are the obligated to) but if and when they do, I will send out a special notice, as I did with the FISTS proposal, and will again ask you to make your opinions known.

The FISTS Proposal is RM-10811 and can be read on the FISTS page.

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KNOWCW (ex. KC8VIO) FISTS USA CLUB CALL

The inaugural year of the FISTS USA Club call can only be described as an incredible success. Thirty-nine operators gave up their own personal operating time to serve as operators of the club call. They deserve a "VRY FB ES TNX" for giving their time to promote CW and promote FISTS.

The operators were: AA1KS, AC7QG, K0KP, K2MKX, K4UK, K6DF, K9JXW, K9PL, KA3AKC, KA9F, KC0M, KD5MDO, KG9LZ, KK6AW, N0BZM, N1PT, N5KY, N6QS, N7QU, N8UW, N9BOR, NG7Z, NU7T, W1GUE, W2YMX (now K2AU), W3ZMN, W4AMW, W5AJX, W8III, W8JCR, W9UZ, WA3GNW, WA5TCZ, WA9PWP, WB5KHC, WB5RYB, WB9WZN, WD8OCV and WS0L.

While no awards are given for working the most stations, I want to acknowledge W5AJX (188), WA5TCZ (179) and N9BOR (172) for holding their fists just right to make those contacts.

Combined all the operators made close to 2,800 contacts, worked all states, worked 52 DXCC entities and brought many new members into our club.

The DXCC entities were: 6Y, 8P, 9A, 9J, 9Y, CE/XQ, CO/CM, CT, DL/DJ/DK, DU, EA/EC, EA8, EI, F, FG, G/M, GI, GM, GW, HB, HO/HP, I/IK, JA/JG/JH, KG4, KH6, KL7/WL7, KP2, KP4, LA, LU, OE, OH, OK, OM, ON, PA, PJ2, PJ7, PY, S5, SM, SP, SV, UA1/RK3/RX3, UA8/UA6/UA9, VE/VA/VO, VK, VP5, XE, YO, YU and ZL. (First prefix is common DXCC list, after "/" are prefixes which were worked in that entity.)

Any FISTS member who (1) has a current FCC issued USA call sign, (2) is current on their FISTS dues and (3) has the permission of the FISTS USA Club Call trustee is eligible to operate the KN0WCW call. You can operate one day up to a maximum of seven days during the calendar year. You can find more information

on the FISTS web site (www.fists.org http://www.fists.org).

If you do not have Internet capabilities, drop me a card at my address below and will be glad to forward you a copy of the operator rules/information for the KN0WCW call.

Assistance with QSL'ing contacts made is also available for any operator who may have difficulty for any reason fulfilling our 100% QSL policy.

And, of course, if you have any questions, you can drop me a note or reach me through my email address below. I hope you will sign up for a day, two or more and have great fun being on the receiving end of a pile up. And, there are also awards for working the KN0WCW call. QRP with K3WWP Column # 61.

Time again to do a new column, and I'll start with info about my web site. I mentioned a couple of issues ago that Alltel would continue to support all of their old style URL's as well as the new ones. Well, that is no longer true, and many of you couldn't find my web site for some time. I did post a message about the situation on the FISTS mailing list, but not everyone subscribes to that so I'll repeat the info here in this Keynote column. You'll have to use http:// home.alltel.net/johnshan/ to get to my web site. All the individual page names, such as cw_ss_column.html remain exactly the same. To sum up, that's 'home' replacing 'www' and no tilde (~) before the johnshan in the URL's. I hope I've made that clear so that you can correct all your bookmarks, favorites, and links if you have them.

Dave, WA9PDS emailed me and wondered if I planned to add any info about solar power for QRP on my web site. I thought that would be a good topic for a Keynote column as well.

First of all, let me say that I have never used solar power at my station and thus have no first hand experience with it. As far as that goes, I've only used regular battery power for QRP a couple of times in my ham career. I guess the closest I've ever come to using direct solar power is using some calculators that had tiny solar panels in them.

There are two basic approaches to solar power. One uses the power directly and the second uses the solar cells to charge rechargeable batteries, which are then used to power the rigs.

If you plan on using solar power one of the first things to be considered is the power requirement. For simple portable operation out in the field with a small QRP rig being the only thing using the power, something that provides 10 watts of power should be sufficient. One such representative unit is a 10 watt epoxy folding solar panel available from Connecticut Solar (http://www.ctsolar.com/Expedition10W.htm). The unit is listed around \$120. It provides 18

volts at 750 ma under full sun conditions. According to the web site info, this is ideal for 12 volt systems, although the output voltage may be too high to use to feed a rig directly. However it can be used with a charge controller and an 8 amp-hour rechargeable battery for many hours of operation out in the field.

The Connecticut Solar web site has a lot of technical information about solar panels that I won't reproduce here. Check out http://www.ctsolar.com/default.htm if you are interested. If you don't have internet service, their regular mailing address is Connecticut Solar LLC, POB 326, Putnam, CT 06260. I have no interest in this particular company, but it is the first one that I found on my Google (www.google.com) search, and that generally means the company is a good one.

An example of a charge controller can be found at http://www.seslogic.com/sunlogic.html. The mail address is SunLight Energy Systems, 955 Manchester Ave. SW, North Lawrence, OH 44666. With that, a solar panel and some rechargeable batteries, you're all ready to operate with the cheapest energy available - solar. Maybe I'll even give it a try myself sometime.

Don't forget, these two companies are not the only source of solar equipment. There are many many more. I only used these two as examples. Do a search on Google, as I always do when I want to find more information on a particular subject.

As I've probably made clear in what I've written so far, my knowledge of solar power is very limited. If any of you who are knowledgeable in the subject would like to provide more information, let me know and I'll include it in a future Keynote column giving you full credit. My friend VA3RJ did a similar thing for me in the Keyonte issue #7 for 1999 with an article on batteries for QRP. If you have that back issue it would be good to review it as re-chargeable batteries are a great way to use solar power. The article is also available in the CW section of my

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web site as are all back issues of these columns. The particular one on batteries is column # 030 in the column index.

As a further preliminary to a possible future column that expands on the solar power issue, please send me any specific questions you may have on the subject and I'll do my best to find an answer for you.

In closing I'd like to mention a new feature on my web site. I now have a visitor survey. The first survey is now history and it proved very successful and the responses were fascinating. My second poll should still be running when you read this. So please check it out and participate. This does not replace my monthly poll that also is continuing, but a full survey is a better way to gather more information at once. For example the first survey involved 12 questions with an average of 6-8 choices for each question plus additional comments.

Operator Hints

1.Don't forget to notify the FCC when you move. It can easily be forgotten. Changing your address in one of the on line call books is great, but the FCC sure hates to get their correspondence back with a FAE (Forwarding Address Expired) sticker on it.

2. I know that we never have enough operating time, but please listen for a few minutes before calling "CQ" or sending "QRL?". Case in point: I was working ZL2SWR on 15M and he was only a 229 with QSB. Twice I had to send QRL to stations that were burying him with their calling "CO" or "QRL?" then "CQ de xxxxx". I will never know if he was able to copy my numbers because I could never get him back. He might have gotten them in the time we were QRM'ed, but will never know. Working a dipole in VT and with the recent band conditions, he would have been a great catch. Please, take the time to listen a bit up and down from your intended operating frequency before transmitting. You might not hear one side of a QSO, but waiting an extra minute may well know there is in fact a QSO in progress. Karl, KB1DSB

Quality Counts
Yesterday I received a question from a fellow who is as concerned about the quality of his sending as about his ability to copy code. He asked if there is anything we can recommend for him, a beginner, to do working alone. The only thing I've come up with is to have him record himself sending prepared text, then listen to it and copy it down. I sent him a kudo just for being concerned about this. I wish more people were! Any other ideas on how to practice sending? 73 Nick K3NY FISTS Nr 3549

Suggestions
Absolutely! Tell him to get a set of paddles and an electronic keyer, and start using them as early in the code-learning process as possible. Iambic keying is not difficult at all — I taught it to myself with absolutely no outside help other than reading a few articles about it. The immediate advantage is that you are instantly sending (and hearing) perfectly-formed Morse code characters. Like many others, I originally started with a straight key, but then received a Heathkit u-Matic "touch paddle" keyer as a Christmas present. I assembled the kit, and it worked perfectly the first time (something I wasn't used to with Heathkits). The capacative touchsensitive paddles worked flawlessly, and my code speed (sending and receiving) took a significant jump within a few days of starting to use it onthe-air. Moreover, getting accostomed to sending "perfect" Morse code also improved my sending with the straight key, since I now knew what everything I was sending was supposed to sound like.

Another trick which improves sending are simple relaxation techniques. Taking a few deep breaths before starting to send, perhaps a few Yoga-like stretches, and making a point of keeping the shoulders relaxed is a big factor in being able to send well. Whenever we are tense, we tend to tighten up our shoulder muscles, which is part of the stress-related "fight or flight" eflex. When we relax that we do a lot better at things which require manual dexterity as opposed to brute strength. Shoulder-relaxation techniques are a big part of the training of competitive shooters, and I know from personal experience, it also works with sending Morse code.

Another technique I recommend is "sending by ear." Actually getting yourself to listen to what you're sending, while you're sending it, is a big factor in getting it to be readable on the other end. Again, using "perfect" sent code as a practice tool, whether it be sending on a paddle/kever. listening to W1AW code-practice bulletins, or tapes/CD's, is the best way to ensure that you will be sending at least as well as you're copying. 73 de Larry, K3LT

If he has HF reception capabilities, I think listening to and copying W1AW code practice transmissions regularly would be very good "practice" to learn what correctly sent CW sounds like! Even if he isn't trying to copy faster, just listening and copying would "train" his brain when it comes to sending. Paul R Goemans **WA9PWP**

I always recommend to beginners that they learn on a straight key — not a keyer. For sending practice I suggest that your student download the software "CWGet," then feed his code practice oscillator output to his sound card. CWGet is one of the better CW Readers. It is tolerant of good, steady hand-sent code - but by that I mean almost machine perfect spacing & weight. But it adapts to slight changes in speed pretty well compared to other software I've seen. I have used this method to improve my Bug fist. Alan N5LF

If you tell him to download CWCom, there is an excellent color photo in the help file which shows how to wire-up either a pump key or a twin paddle to a serial port. Even I could understand it, which is saying something. 73, Chris (G4PDJ)

Here's a thought if he has a computer. Have him key a code oscillator and feed the tone into his sound card and use a code recognition program to read what he's sending. He could use CWCom (http://www.mrx.com.au/d cwcom.htm) for this. My impression from using it for a while is that it's not very forgiving when it comes to reading what's sent. And it's free. 73! Dan KB6NU

Suggest he download/purchase a computer based 'code reader' such as CWget, MRP40, etc. My

If the computer can copy his code reliably, then his fist has to be pretty good. MEMBERS' PROFILES

ZL1KF- Les # 9627, writes about himself: - I have held a call for about 30 years now, with my full call being active for the past 10 years. I have always been keen on Morse and was very active on 80m up until 6 years ago. I now find a renewed interest in 20 metres, which is my main band, however I can easily operate on both 80 and 40 as well. I am married and live in Hamilton and also find myself active in the local NZART Branch 12. I am very interested in QRP also and believe that great things can be achieved with simple homebrew radios and antenna. I also find tube equipment fun too! Vintage radio and tube audio are my other interests and as I work as an electronic service technician in today's complex world, easy to build and operate equipment really appeals to me.

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CALL VK3FDU / 3

In VK particularly, Fists Club calls are quite a rarity, apart from ZL6FF. Surprising really, when one looks at the long list of 3 and 5 point calls in USA.

So it was with great interest bordering on shock, when my relatively near neighbour Chris, VK3CGB told me just before Christmas, that he had asked for VK2FDU over the holiday period. He suggested we share operating sessions as and when mutually convenient, enabling us to arrange at a few moments notice by means of a phone call or QSO on two metres.

My first session turned out to be on the morning of 21st Dec, (2130z on 20th Dec) A time of the day when I often check 20 or 30m while eating breakfast cereal! It is noticeable that I often hear several USA stations, but have a job to raise one. I think they are all suffering a high noise level and/or not expecting to hear DX.

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Usually once I have made a QSO, there is a pile up and a queue while the right skip conditions exist.

My first and only QSO that day was with AG4ZE Alan, Fists 10413 with 559 each way on 14.058. The Christmas period then intervened. (I had to be sociable some of the time). On 29th Dec, I had a better and longer session on 20m at both ends of the day, working England, USA, Japan, New Zealand and the Netherlands.

Two days later, 30m and 20m featured with a selection of calls adding another 11 QSOs in the log. On 2nd and 3rd of Jan (40, 30 and 20m), I made another 12 contacts including 4 VK's in VK2, VK4, VK6, and VK8 areas, all Fists members. The biggest surprise of all, was a weak but solid signal from Z2JGC in Harare. Brian wanted to know all about Fists and seemed most interested in becoming a member. The first time in 40 years of Amateur Radio I have heard Zimbabwe, let alone worked the country. What made it more interesting, was the fact that I had visited the country exploring many of its scenic areas and meeting many friendly folk, before the current political upheaval.

My short time with VK2FDU/3 proved to be a memorable one and to summarise I made 33 QSOs, 23 being on 20m, 2 on 40m and 8 on 30m. A total of 12 different countries, 7 were USA, 11 English, 4 VK, the others being PA, Z2, ZL, F, D, OE, J, RX and VE. 17 of the stations worked were Fists Members, 18 were Non Fists and I feel confident that at least two of those may join us soon.

A few notes on operating. It was noticeable (as usual) that calling "CQ Fists" seems to mean very little to some, as non Fists stations reply in quantity. I always work them. The suggested 058 Fists frequencies are often very busy and although this time, I did mainly stick to very near 058 (Well, surely FDU has some rights!) I believe it is high time we spread out a little more, listening around or better still using 058 as a starting point and then deliberately QSYing to a clear spot far enough away to avoid QRM, giving others the chance to call on 058.

There are many standards of code heard from Fists members, which is no bad thing and with the large amount of newcomers to CW (yes, I think there are many converts in the pipeline) it can be very important to adjust speed to suit the occasion, either operator or band condx.

Many times I work stations knocking on at 25wpm in difficult condx, repeating everything two or three times when a simple QRS to say 15 or 18 wpm sending once only, would in fact pass the information quicker! I have no objection to adjusting to very slow CW stations, who obviously have to start somewhere and need the confidence and practice of a solid QSO. I'm sure most Fists members would whole-heartedly agree. But it does help if those stations make an effort to use the usual abbreviations and cut out irrelevant words. Like: VK3DBD de VK3XYZ VK3XYZ Thanks for the call = nice to meet you - my name is John my name is John my QTH is Melbourne Melbourne your RST 599 599 please my report so back to you etc. When the conditions are good the repetition is not needed and many words can be left out, so it would become VK3DBD de VK3XYZ TNX CALL PSED TO MEET U NAME JOHN QTH MELBOURNE UR RST 599 = TU VK3DBD de VK3XYZ KN (Yes I know there really is a VK3XYZ, but this is a hypothetical example!)

It may be prudent to note that regulations require our call every 10 minutes, so a simple BK to change over, is often all that is required, especially when working familiar stations or in good band conditions. Slick operating even at moderate speeds can come very close to information exchange at speeds of normal SSB chat, short overs and BK-in mode as most modern transceivers have, can almost reproduce a duplex communications link. David, VK3DBD, Yackandandah.

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THOSE TUNERS

In reference to a previous item concerning QRM from stations tuning up on frequency, G3HAL asks me to remind you that aside from dummy loads, noise bridges are extremely useful. Radcom for April 2001 covers an easily constructed version with a useful add-on in the September 2001 edition.

ROCK MITE

This is not some hitherto undiscovered insect which burrows into solid stone but a small rock-bound QRP transmitter. It would appear that there is a dearth of 'baccy tins' out there in the colonies so Chuck sent one over to Stan (K4FU) in a batch of QSL cards which Stan used to construct this flea power unit. Following this, Chuck built one himself (he seems to be well blessed with such tins) and is most enthusiastic about the results. Originally, he found himself in the company of SSTV signals but raided his piggy bank for 7.030 Mhz rocks. It's output is a magnificent 400mW and a QSO with a German station at 550 miles qualified him for the QRP-ARCI 1000 miles per watt certificate. Not having a dedicated QRP TX, I need to turn down the wick on my FT1000 MP to get what appears to be a minimum of 4 watts (though this could be reduced via a resistive network) and must confess that my QRP activity has been neglected of late. Well done Chuck. That's not bad bang per buck!

RE-ISSUE OF CALLSIGNS

A further item from G3ZPF contains the rather disturbing observation that there is an ongoing trend for new licencees to apply for the callsign of deceased amateurs. I understand that it has always been the policy of the agency to re-issue the callsigns of deceased licence holders when such a request is accompanied by approval of the immediate family but this latter requirement no longer seems to be necessary. His letter to the RA asks if it is possible to restrict re-issue to family members after he has been planted. Not sure if he got a reply yet?

DL1CC AND ESPERANTO

At last the report on my activities in the FIST frequencies with various countries.

For more than 40 years, I was living in the former GDR (German Democratic Republic). As no doubt you already know, our frontiers were closed to us, apart from being able to go to other nearby counties in the Soviet block.

Now that I am a pensioner and everything has changed, I am making the most of being able to travel to as many countries as possible.

This year, I went to Málaga EA7, and was active as EA7/DL1CC in 40 to 10 m, making contact with many FIST members. Together with G-SWL Ian and DK8RE, we went from Málaga by ship to Melilla (EA9) for 6 days. We were also active there in the 40 to 10m bands, again making contact with many FIST members in CW, also in SSB and had more than 5000 QSO's, with 420 British stations altogether. On two days we also used the call sign EA9URM.

In May we went to Yalta. During several weekends there we used the station UU5JK as UU/DLICC. In June, I was active for IOTA on Wolin Island (EU 132). There I had an interesting call sign SOICC. The ususual prefix and the IOTA number attracted many DX-stations. While there, I also worked in 50 MHz. I cannot use 6m in Germany, but in Poland those frequencies are allowed FISTS CW CLUB NEWS LETTER

After a short break at home, I went to Gotenburg at the end of July for the Annual International Esperanto Conference. In spite of the week's busy programme of specialist meetings, visits and cultural events, I managed to find time to use the ILERA club station 8S6UEA (Universal Esperanto Asocio). Amongst the approximately 2000 delegates at the conference from 75 countries, there were 25 radio amateurs coming from many parts of the world. Amongst my 540 QSO's there were alo some FISTS-QSO's.

In August we went by ship from Gotenburg via Kristiansand to Newcastle-on-Tyne, and from there to Liverpool, then to the Wirral Peninsular, where I was Ian's guest (aktiva SWL) in Wallasey. Using the IC706 and a Keleman-dipolo, almost every day I listened and transmitted in the FISTS frequencies. Then again in Barlaston, where I took part in the Esperanto Summer School holiday arranged by the British Esperanto

Asociation who have their headquarters there. After that I visited Wales, Scotland, The Isle of Man and Ireland, where I was able to use the North Dublin Club's station (EI5NDR). After that, I went to Felixstowe and then a few days in London with Lenio, (G000S) - Secretary of ILERA—International League of Esperantist Radio Amateurs. Then, it was back home again to Germany on 15th of September. At the end of October, I came here to Santa Ponsa on the island of Mallorca (EU004), where I will be staying until 17th January 2004. I amtransmitting regularly in 14.058 and 21.058 MHz, and have had many very interesting QSO's. It is also very interesting to contact QRP stations with only one or two watts. My maximum power is 100 watts using IC706 mk IIG and the Keleman Dipole in the 20, 15 and 10 m. 1 can also

contact with 17 and 12 m using low wattage.
The plan is to go again to Melilla (EA9) for a week or two after 16th December, and I hope to be able to work in all frequencies. Please check all FIST frequencies. I am already making plans for 2004, and will willingly send you reports on my activities. For Christmas and the New Year 2004 I wish all FIST club members and their families the very best, good DX, and of course good health.
